Assignment 3: Write a Reflective Essay

Students will **choose one (1)** of the two prompts below and will write an essay that strongly supports their thesis. Students will be graded on the criteria in the rubric below. Your essay should be typed, double-spaced, Times New Roman font, two pages in length and completed in a Google Doc. (You will upload your doc into the Canvas "Reflective Essay Turn In" when finished.) A reflective essay focuses on the writer, and their experiences. Your thesis/focus will be what you learned in the ordinary moment, or what time means to you in your life.

Choose One (1):

- Ordinary moments can shape a person or the world. In this essay, write about an ordinary moment that shaped you or the world as you know it.
 -In this essay you should not only explain the moment, but it's impact on your life or the world. Is there a specific moment/event that taught you something about yourself or the world?
- We've often heard the expression, "Time is of the essence," meaning something needs to be done in a timely manner or quickly. In this essay, explore the meaning of "time" as it pertains to your life.

-In this essay you should write about how time impacts your life. Do you think time is something to treasure and value? Does age determine how one values time?
